### STATE REVOLVING FUND AMENDMENT 5 TO LOAN AGREEMENT WW110922 CITY OF EVERGLADES CITY

This amendment is executed by the STATE OF FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION (Department) and the CITY OF EVERGLADES CITY, FLORIDA, (Local Government) existing as a local governmental entity under the laws of the State of Florida. Collectively, the Department and the Local Government shall be referred to as "Parties" or individually as "Party".

The Department and the Local Government entered into a State Revolving Fund Loan Agreement, Number WW110922, as amended, authorizing a Loan amount of \$500,000, excluding Capitalized Interest, including a Principal Forgiveness amount of \$338,050; and

The Loan Amount, Principal Forgiveness amount, Semiannual Loan Payment amount, Loan Service Fee, and Project costs need adjustment to reflect actual costs; and

Certain provisions of the Agreement need to be revised.

The Parties hereto agree as follows:

- 1. The total amount awarded is reduced by \$10,983.00 of which the Principal Forgiveness portion is \$7,425.62 and the Loan amount is \$3,557.38. The revised total amount awarded is \$489,017.00. Of that, the Principal Forgiveness is \$330,624.38.
- 2. The Loan Service Fee is \$9,780. The fee represents two percent of the Loan amount excluding Capitalized Interest; that is, two percent of \$489,017.
- 3. The total amount of the Loan is \$171,440.87, which consists of \$158,392.62 disbursed to the Local Government, \$3,268.25 of accrued Capitalized Interest and \$9,780.00 of service fee charges.
- 4. The total amount remaining to repay, is \$171,440.87, consisting of unpaid principal of the Loan of \$161,660.87 and an unpaid service fee charge of \$9,780.00.
- 5. The Semiannual Loan Payment amount is hereby revised and shall be in the amount of \$5,195.04. Such payments shall be received by the Department on February 15, 2023 and semiannually thereafter on August 15 and February 15 of each year until all amounts due hereunder have been fully paid.

### CITY OF EVERGLADES CITY Grant Policies and Procedures

### I. Policies and Procedures for Identifying and Selecting Grants

The City encourages seeking grants that will assist in reaching the Council's strategic goals and initiatives, including those stated in the City's comprehensive plan.

Recommendations for grants to be applied for will be authorized by Mayor prior to being presented to City Council for approval. Recommendations shall include:

- The purpose of obtaining the grant funding;
- the source of the grant funding;
- whether matching funds are required and if so, what the source of the City's matching funds is proposed to be;
- whether the grant funds must be spent within a specific period, and if so, the specific period;
- full disclosure of future grant-related requirements and restrictions;
- how the grant will affect future operating costs and/or revenues of the City (including whether there are sufficient staff resources to effectively administer the grant and any related program or resulting capital asset); and
- any other information that would help the City Council in evaluating whether to apply.

### II. Policies and Procedures for Accepting Grants

Upon award of a grant, acceptance shall be by the City Council by resolution.

### III. Policies and Procedures for Grant Agreements and Amendments Thereto

All grant agreements and amendments shall be executed by the Mayor, after approval by the City Council by resolution.

### IV. Policies and Procedures for Yearly Budget Amendments for Grants

Once per fiscal year, the Finance Director shall, at a meeting prior to the period expiring after 60 days of the fiscal year, provide a budget amendment accounting for all grant funds received that were not already in the budget, if necessary.

### V. Policies and Procedures for Actions Upon Award of Grant

Once a grant has been awarded to the City and accepted by City Council, the City Clerk shall assemble the below and provide to the Finance Department:

- a copy of the grant application;
- a copy of the executed grant award agreement;
- a copy of the agenda item as it was presented to City Council;
- a copy of the minutes of the meeting where the Council approved applying for the grant;

- a copy of the minutes of the meeting where the Council approved the grant award and the budget amendment, if applicable; and
- a copy of the budget for the grant project.

The above shall be the "Grant File".

### VI. Policies and Procedures for Monitoring Grant Compliance

The Mayor will designate a knowledgeable staff person to monitor the requirements of the grant (the "Grant Manager"). The Mayor may determine it necessary to hire outside assistance, if significant monitoring is required. For example, the project engineering firm may provide Davis-Bacon field compliance staff or a LAP certified technician. To the extent the CCNA applies, it shall be followed. The Grant Manager as well as the Finance Administrator and City Clerk shall be responsible for all grant deadlines.

Coordination with the Finance Department is expected to ensure compliance with Federal regulations in 2 CFR Section 200.

The Grant Manager, or a representative of the Grant Manager shall routinely monitor all applicable contracted vendors to ensure compliance with technical specifications and state and federal requirements, maintain adequate cost and budget controls, and process necessary contract changes to bring the grant project to completion on time.

### VII. Policies and Procedures for Grant Procurement

All purchases and bids will be reviewed and/or directed by the City's Finance Department. The City's Grant procurement policy addresses the standard for meeting Federal regulations in 2 CFR Section 200.

### VIII. Policies and Procedures for Grant Draws, Financial Reports, and Close-Outs

All draws, financial reports, close-outs for grants will be reviewed by the City's finance department, prior to submittal.

### IX. Policies and Procedures for Receipt of Grant Funds

All Grant funds received shall be received, reviewed by, and recorded by the City's Billing Clerk. To the extent a deposit is required, the City's Billing Clerk shall also make said deposit. The Finance Administrator shall reconcile all received grant funds to the master accounting ledger at least once per month.

### X. Policies and Procedures for Expending Funds Before Reimbursement by Grant Funds

All funds, which are being spent in advance of grant fund reimbursement, must be approved by the Grant Manager, the Finance Administrator and the Mayor. Any checks written with grant funds must be executed in accordance with the City Charter, which

requires the signature of the Mayor and the City Clerk. The Finance Administrator shall record and reconcile all expended funds.

### XI. Policies and Procedures for Expending Grant Funds

All grant funds, before expenditure, must be approved by the Finance Administrator, the Grant Manager, and the Mayor. Any checks written with grant funds must be executed in accordance with the City Charter, which requires the signature of the Mayor and the City Clerk. The Finance Administrator shall record and reconcile all expended grant funds.

### XII. Policies and Procedures for Grant Financial Reporting

The finance department is responsible for determining accounting and financial reporting accuracy in conformance with generally accepted accounting principles and GASB pronouncements, as well as documenting receipts and payments for grant-related activities.

### XIII. Policies and Procedures for Other Internal Controls

The City will provide oversight and internal control for all grant funds as pursuant to the additional internal controls developed through the Finance Administrator and those statutes and regulations promulgated by the Federal, State, and granting authorities, as well as specific internal controls as specified in various grant agreements.

### XIV. Policies and Procedures for Non-Compliance

The Mayor, Grant Manager, Finance Administrator, and the City Clerk will take prompt action when circumstances change or non-compliance is suspected or identified, in order to provide adequate safeguarding of the grant revenues and assurance that only allowable expenditures are charged to the grant and compliance with all aspects of 2 CFR Section 200.

### XV. Policies and Procedures for SEFA and CFDA

The Finance Administrator will be responsible for the complete and accurate compilation of the fiscal year end SEFA schedule as well as verification of grant contract expenditures reconciled to general ledger, and accurate CFDA numbers and program titles.

### XVI. Policies and Procedures for Conflict of Interest

Grant audit findings due to conflicts of interest can damage the reputation and credibility of the City. Further, the appearance of a conflict of interest can be just as damaging to the City's reputation and credibility as an actual conflict. The purpose of this policy is to avoid the appearance, as well as the actuality, of any conflict of interest or breach of trust by an official or employee of the City of Everglades City.

1. No officer official or employee of the City of Everglades City shall have any interest, financial or otherwise, direct or indirect, or have any arrangement concerning prospective employment that will, or may be reasonably expected to, bias the

- design, conduct, or reporting of a grant funded project on which he or she is working.
- 2. The Department Head and/or Grant Project Manager for each particular grant funded project shall ensure that in the use of project funds, officials or employees of the City of Everglades City and nongovernmental recipients or sub-recipients shall avoid any action that might result in, or create the appearance of:
  - a. Using his or her official position for private gain
  - b. Giving preferential treatment to any person or organization
  - c. Losing complete independence or impartiality
  - d. Making an official decision outside official channels
  - e. Affecting adversely public confidence in the grant funded program in particular and the City of Everglades City in general.
  - f. Any violation of this provision is governed by any City of Everglades City Polices & Procedures, i.e., City of Everglades City's Procurement Policy.

### XVII. Policies and Procedures for Grant Close Out

Upon completion of a grant, other than retention of files, the Finance Administrator shall prepare a memorandum that identifies the Grant and describes the final disposition. The memorandum shall be reviewed, approved, and signed by the Grant Manager. This memorandum shall be added to the Grant File the Grant File shall be provided to the City Clerk for retention.

### CITY OF EVERGLADES CITY Grant Policies and Procedures

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The City encourages seeking grants that will assist in reaching the Council's strategic goals and initiatives, including those stated in the City's comprehensive plan.

Recommendations for grants to be applied for will be authorized by Mayor prior to being presented to City Council for approval. Recommendations shall include:

- The purpose of obtaining the grant funding;
- the source of the grant funding;
- whether matching funds are required and if so, what the source of the City's matching funds is proposed to be;
- whether the grant funds must be spent within a specific period, and if so, the specific period;
- full disclosure of future grant-related requirements and restrictions;
- how the grant will affect future operating costs and/or revenues of the City (including whether there are sufficient staff resources to effectively administer the grant and any related program or resulting capital asset); and
- any other information that would help the City Council in evaluating whether to apply.

### II. Policies and Procedures for Accepting Grants

Upon award of a grant, acceptance shall be by the City Council by resolution.

### III. <u>Policies and Procedures for Grant Agreements and Amendments</u> Thereto

All grant agreements and amendments shall be executed by the Mayor, after approval by the City Council by resolution.

### IV. Policies and Procedures for Yearly Budget Amendments for Grants

Once per fiscal year, the Finance Director shall, at a meeting prior to the period expiring after 60 days of the fiscal year, provide a budget amendment accounting for all grant funds received that were not already in the budget, if necessary.

### V. Policies and Procedures for Actions Upon Award of Grant

Once a grant has been awarded to the City and accepted by City Council, the City Clerk shall assemble the below and provide to the Finance Department:

- a copy of the grant application;
- a copy of the executed grant award agreement;
- a copy of the agenda item as it was presented to City Council;
- a copy of the minutes of the meeting where the Council approved applying for the grant;

- a copy of the minutes of the meeting where the Council approved the grant award and the budget amendment, if applicable; and
- a copy of the budget or budget amendment, if applicable for the grant project.

The above shall be the "Grant File".

### VI. Policies and Procedures for Monitoring Grant Compliance

The Mayor will designate a knowledgeable staff person to monitor the requirements of the grant (the "Grant Manager"). The Mayor may determine it necessary to hire outside assistance, if significant monitoring is required. For example, the project engineering firm may provide Davis-Bacon field compliance staff or a LAP certified technician. To the extent the CCNA applies, it shall be followed. The Grant Manager as well as the Finance Administrator and City Clerk shall be responsible for all grant deadlines.

Coordination with the Finance Department is expected to ensure compliance with Federal regulations in 2 CFR Section 200.

The Grant Manager, or a representative of the Grant Manager shall routinely monitor all applicable contracted vendors to ensure compliance with technical specifications and state and federal requirements, maintain adequate cost and budget controls, and process necessary contract changes to bring the grant project to completion on time.

### VII. Policies and Procedures for Grant Procurement

All purchases and bids will be reviewed and/or directed by the City's Finance Department. The City's Grant procurement policy addresses the standard for meeting Federal regulations in 2 CFR Section 200.

### VIII. <u>Policies and Procedures for Grant Draws, Financial Reports, and Close-</u> Outs

All draws, financial reports, close-outs for grants will be reviewed by the City's finance department, prior to submittal.

### IX. Policies and Procedures for Receipt of Grant Funds

All Grant funds received shall be received, reviewed by, and recorded by the City's Billing Clerk. To the extent a deposit is required, the City's Billing Clerk shall also make said deposit. The Finance Administrator shall reconcile all received grant funds to the master accounting ledger at least once per month.

### X. <u>Policies and Procedures for Expending Funds Before Reimbursement</u> by Grant Funds

All funds, which are being spent in advance of grant fund reimbursement, must be approved by both the Grant Manager, the Finance Administrator and the Mayor. Any checks written with grant funds must be executed in accordance with the City Charter,

which requires the signature of the Mayor and the City Clerk. The Finance Administrator shall record and reconcile all expended funds.

#### XI. Policies and Procedures for Expending Grant Funds

All grant funds, before expenditure, must be approved by both—the Finance Administrator, the Grant Manager, and the Mayor. Any checks written with grant funds must be executed in accordance with the City Charter, which requires the signature of the Mayor and the City Clerk. The Finance Administrator shall record and reconcile all expended grant funds.

#### XII. Policies and Procedures for Grant Financial Reporting

The finance department is responsible for determining accounting and financial reporting accuracy in conformance with generally accepted accounting principles and GASB pronouncements, as well as documenting receipts and payments for grant-related activities.

The City will provide oversight and internal control for all grant funds as pursuant to the additional internal controls developed through the Finance Administrator and those statutes and regulations promulgated by the Federal, State, and granting authorities, as well as specific internal controls as specified in various grant agreements.

The Mayor, Grant Manager, Finance Administrator, and the City Clerk will take prompt action when circumstances change or non-compliance is suspected or identified, in order to provide adequate safeguarding of the grant revenues and assurance that only allowable expenditures are charged to the grant and compliance with all aspects of 2 CFR Section 200.

#### XV. Policies and Procedures for SEFA and CFDA

The Finance Administrator will be responsible for the complete and accurate compilation of the fiscal year end SEFA schedule as well as verification of grant contract expenditures reconciled to general ledger, and accurate CFDA numbers and program titles.

#### CITY OWNED RESIDENTIAL DOCK LEASE AGREEMENT April 1, 2022 thru September 30, 2022

- Expresses the strongest possible support for Florida municipalities, counties, and wastewater utilities completing upgrades of wastewater treatment systems that employ Advanced Wastewater Treatment and Best Available Technology for disposal of resulting wastewater including monitoring of the impacts of reused water on the environment, and ultimately reducing flows of nutrients, harmful bacteria and other pathogens, and Emerging Contaminants of Concern through the South Florida ecosystem and into the receiving waters of the Sanctuary.
- Urges Florida Municipalities, counties, and wastewater utilities to consider the State Revolving Fund and other sources of financial support for these purposes.
- Section 3.
